Block by Block

BxB participants partnered with 11 Teaching Artists across artistic mediums to explore the role of music and Identity

Participants explored the connection between music and fine art through sessions like "Funk and Fantasy" and working with teaching artists to discover the history and connection between punk music and zinemaking.

In the spring, BxB worked with the Savannah Jazz Academy through a four-part workshop series combining original youth poetry with the youth jazz musicians' rhythms and beats.

Student original work, artist features, and more make up their annual anthology; this year's is titled **"Rhythm Blues & Light"**



Slam Team

This group of dynamic youth artists collaborated with adult artistallies to bring Savannah's spoken-word slam culture to the next generation of voices and make Savannah a more just and equitable place.

Deep's Slam Team hosted their own competitions around Savannah and had the opportunity to perform at multiple venues, including at the Juneteenth Youth Arts Festival and the Tybee MLK Commemoration.

The team competed at the national level at the 2024 Brave New Voices conference in Washington, D.C., where one member won gold at the MC Olympics.



Community Drop-In

142 youth ages 7-18 engaged in Drop-In programs regularly across **four sites** around Savannah

In addition to furthering its goals of creating easy-entry and accessible spaces for positive youth development across Savannah, Drop-In continued its mission to be a welcoming space for low-income and systems-impacted young people.

WREP

The Work Readiness Enrichment Program continued to serve as a model in the Savannah area for restorative alternatives for youth in the juvenile justice system.

This year, **WREP engaged 11 young men** with a trauma-informed approach and sought to reimagine narratives and build opportunity through collaboration with program youth.

Justice Day in Atlanta

Three WREP youth joined Deep staff on an intergenerational panel discussing the preventative measures and restorative practices that could have and should have been in place to divert them from the juvenile justice system.

Action Research Team

In ART's program year, 14 participants:

Hosted a Youth Summit, facilitating a panel with local youth activists and holding listening sessions on school improvement themes

Visited the State Capitol to learn about advocacy and met with a professor of multicultural education at Spelman College

Compiled a Research Report on Student Burnout and held dialogues with student stakeholders on the challenges facing them in their school settings

Hosted the Fourth Annual Freedom School to explore youth organizing

Action Research Team



In 2023-24, Deep's **Healing Schools** initiatives have continued to make strides toward education justice through work with both students and adult allies.

Healing Schools Programs

We continued expanding our work with **ADULTS**, *including reaching* **123** *direct educators through* **16** *workshops and countless hours of individualized support*, to make sure youth are seen in their full humanity and to advocate for administrative and legislative policies that make Savannah a safe place for all young people and their families.

Second Annual Unconference

A reimagined conference for educators, led by educators from the Deep Writing Project. The conference was keynoted by Omkari L. Williams, author of Micro Activism: How You Can Make a Difference in the World (Without a Bullhorn).

Regional & National Recognition

Presented with Advisory Council Board of educator partners at the Georgia Council Teachers of English Conference

Already trained in the Mindful Self-Compassion curriculum, our program staff adapted the curriculum specifically for educators to incorporate layers of systems analysis.

FIERCE Self-Compassion Workshop Hosted with Savannah High School to create space for open and honest dialogue between stakeholders and create a definition of what "restorative practices" means, specific to that school culture

Building Power Community Organizing & Advocacy

Deep's Community Organizing focuses on two key areas with both youth and adults: movement-building among grassroots communities and pushing for policy change through campaigns.

With that focus as our guide, a lot has been happening this year in our Community Organizing Team's mission to engage adults around the Savannah–Chatham communities:





All Spark

A monthly workshop series for young adults to promote community building and information raising. It functions as an entry-level space for individuals to engage with the advocacy space and bring information and calls-to-action to community members, including justice-engaged young people.

Adult Organizing

A space for mobilized stakeholders to come together around specific issues central to justice reform and equity. This team does it all: leading community advocates to promote policy awareness, partnering with community organizations to lead teach-ins on building a restorative community, sitting on panels with the Offender Alumni Association, and hosting expungement clinics with The DeVetter Law Firm.

Barbershop Series

2024 also began a series of dialogues held in communitycentric spaces like barbershops, covering topics including restorative justice, second chances, and citizen reentry. Program goals are community building, resource sharing, and storytelling.

A Decade with Deep

From Young Author Program participant to Staff Member

Now that Deep Center is in our 16th year, we are starting to get asked where do our alumni go? Who do they become? **We sat down recently with one alumnus, Sam Poole, who engaged in every program Deep offered, starting in middle school.** Sam reflected on his first days with YAP: "When I first joined, they told us we were going to read poetry, and I was the only one who didn't want to get into poetry, but I'll never forget how that changed...



"I remember the Writing Fellow mentor telling me that one of my poems was her favorite poem, but I didn't really believe her. I had to perform it at a final show, and more people said they liked my work. I finally understood that she **meant** it, that she wasn't just saying that. And that right there made me feel like a poet. And ever since then, I've been calling myself a poet."

Sam went on to try out other Deep programs like the Action Research Team and was in the inaugural class of Block by Block. While in these programs, he and his fellow poets got to experience their first slam competition and expressed a desire for Deep to create its own slam team.

NO VALUE. NO PRICE. by SAMUEL "THE ONE" POOLE

What is value if there's no price? That's what they ask me. I told them, Until you see rich heritage living with rich character, growing up with rich culture, you won't see how priceless this is money can never clean up the blood shed.

Yet they ask. I tell them, Until you taste meals prepared by the family in that small kitchen, until you hear how first and fourth cousins laughed in that den, until you see how the family mourned the dead.

Yet they ask. I tell them, You will never know until you've lived it. Until you've been upgraded from sleeping on the floor to a queen-sized bed, been supported by Grandma's rocking chair, been burned by that raggedy stove, been washed in that small tub, been hugged in that same room, been told that you own that home, you will never know the value of my situation.

Yet they ask and ask and ask. And I say, there's no price to love, pain, happiness.

"All the Deep programs, they came about because staff asked what we, as young people, wanted or felt like we needed—and then they listened. I trusted that what I said would be heard."

After graduating, Sam went on to join the Army National Guard and enroll in college at Winston-Salem State University. He sought out ways to engage in poetry, but came up empty on campus. With the support of mentors, Sam saw a need and filled it, starting a Slam Poetry Team and hosting open mic nights for peers—a legacy that lives on as a campus organization after his graduation.


As of August, Sam has now come full circle with Deep Center. He has gone from participant to employee as a proud Site Coordinator for the Young Author Project, stepping into the very role that lit a spark in him as a middle school student.

"Try everything—don't run from anything. At first you may think you can't do it or that it isn't cool, but later on you will find out that it might be something you will grow in life from and it may be a healing outlet for you. Deep is the healing outlet that we don't always know we need." - Sam Poole

Organizational Health

Deep is strong and stable. Expense increases over the 2023-24 year are a result of program expansion driven by increased community demand and income, along with staff salary increases in response to inflation. Surpluses are due to increases in general operating support and multi-year grants received in one year and allocable across multiple years.

Currently, inflation is moving faster than grant income, and consistent, engaged support from our donors will make it possible for Deep to keep pace with these new financial pressures.




FY23 Income Sources

- Deep's staff is 65% people of color; 45% of staff identify as LGBTQ+.
